






# St Oswald's Church – who are we?

#### Letter from Tony

Dear Friends, It hardly seems possible that it is already a month since we said farewell to Robert, as he celebrated Easter with us at his final service on Easter Day. Though tinged with some sadness, it was a day of real celebration as we joined together in celebrating our risen Lord and Robert's 17 years of ministry with us.

I am writing this the day after attending Robert's licensing as Associate Minister at Great St Mary's, Sawbridgeworth, where it was my pleasure to have a role in the service, commending Robert to the people of that parish. We wish Robert every blessing in this next stage in his ministry.

The Archdeacon of Hertford, the Venerable Janet Mackenzie opened the service of licensing with a prayer celebrating the ministry of the whole people

of God. This resonated particularly with me as a fitting reminder to us at St. Oswald's of our responsibility to fulfil our calling as the people of God in in our parish as we move into a period of vacancy.

While the primary responsibility may rest with Helen and Anne-Georgina, as the Officers of the Bishop, in the absence of a Vicar, we are all called to be witnesses and ministers for Christ. Each of us will have a role to play in supporting our churchwardens and others who take on additional responsibilities over the coming months.

While the term vacancy implies an absence of something, I believe our experience of past periods of vacancy does show that this can be a positive time for the parish. Robert may have been with us for 17 years but prior to that, we experienced two periods of vacancy within 5 years. Those times showed that it can be a time of spiritual growth as people take on roles that enable them to exercise greater personal ministry. During a vacancy we also benefit from welcoming a variety of different priests from diverse backgrounds.

One of the aims of our parish over recent years, encouraged and supported by Robert, has been to develop more diverse forms of worship, with a view to reaching out and connecting with different people. This has been particularly evident in the introduction of our Spotlight Services on the third Sunday of the month, focusing on topics of wider interest from a Christian perspective. There has also been a change of emphasis in our Family Services, seeking to engage families with young children.

There is also much activity, that takes place outside formal worship. Café O on Mondays each week and the Trinity Project Donut and Hot Dog Clubs for Year 7 and 8 children on Fridays each month are examples our wider outreach into the community.

Many readers may be wondering how long the period of vacancy will last. In the past, I can recall that at one time a minimum period was imposed by the diocese for financial reasons. I am pleased to note however that the diocese is already taking steps to look to the future. A Parish Vacancy Meeting has been arranged for Thursday 5 June at 7.30 pm in Church with Bishop Jane and Archdeacon Charles. This is an opportunity for us to indicate our priorities going forward and what qualities we may be looking for in our new Vicar. Everyone is welcome to come along and join in the discussion and express their own opinion about the future of St. Oswald's.

If you have any particular wishes you would like see realised but are unable to come along please do make your views and wishes known to one of the churchwardens, or feel free to speak to me personally. It is likely that the process of recruiting and appointing a new Vicar will take place in the autumn, although it will, almost certainly, be some time after that before they are able to take up duty.

For this meeting we were very pleased to welcome Stephen Martin and his wife Jennie. He had his first guitar at 18 that Jennie had bought him and is self taught. Stephen had brought along four different guitars, Washburn Orleans J10 Jazz Guitar, Martin America Semi Acoustic Modern guitar,

Electric Gibson Les Paul Guitar and a Classic Spanish Guitar a Martin Notley Number three of 10 made and this one was made to fit the size of Stephens hand. Each guitar plays differently to any other and Stephen illustrated this with his playing. His expertise and knowledge is second to none.



He played several Beatles' songs and a Monkeys' song that we could sing-a-long to, and songs that he had written. We had the opportunity to ask many, many questions and we learnt a lot about playing guitars and the different sounds that can be produced.

#### A CROXLEY RAMBLER'S DIARY

Brian Thomson enjoys a spring walk - 15th April 2025

The air was moist as I approached the station. Overnight rain had scattered pink petals on the pavement from the ornamental cherries. I got off the train at Chalfont and Latimer and found my way along Chenies Avenue amongst large Metroland villas and their modern counterparts into the green haze of new leaves in West Wood. I paused to listen to the birdsong - a blackbird, robin, wren, great tit, wood pigeon. The air was still and humid as I followed the path down into the valley. At the foot of the slope there are several horse chestnuts. One in particular must be very old judging by its girth. Their leaves were well advanced and their candle flowers were starting to show. That seems early in the season to me.

Across the road I joined a couple of fishermen on their way to the Chess. The water seemed to be flowing clear and they told me that water quality is good at the moment. That is pleasing to hear after all

the news about pollution in the river. (According to sewagemap.co.uk the previous discharge at Chesham ended on the 26th February and lasted for just 30 minutes. There was a more serious discharge in January.) I spent a few minutes on the bridge watching the cascade from the artificial lake known as Great Water and admiring some kingcups by the stream. A small herd of black cattle lay quietly in the field nearby. I made my way uphill onto the footpath in front of Latimer House where there is a



pleasant view of the lake, albeit today somewhat curtailed in the misty air.

The first swallow I have seen this year flew down towards the lake where a patient fisherman watched his line from a boat. I was surprised to find cow parsley in flower and hawthorn buds about to open - again signs that spring is moving faster than in previous years. The path edges had plenty of other flowers including white dead nettles, ground ivy and cowslips. I retraced my steps and walked to Latimer village where the green surrounded by old cottages is a picture whatever the weather. The Chess valley path towards Chenies

crosses a meadow which is usually wet. I had expected a dry passage after about a month of blue skies and drought but not a bit of it. There must be a spring at the top of the field.

After squelching through I crossed to the edge of the river where old Flaunden village used to be. There are a few lumps and bumps marking the remains and a blackcap sang from the scrub now covering much of the site. I must have read the interpretation board before but noticed for the first time that it contains a poem by Barbara Sedassy, an artist who now lives in Chorleywood. She wrote: -

#### Dogwood by the River Chess

We went to the copse more than once,
My dad and I
Sometimes we had to climb over a locked gate.
It was a secret place - forbidden perhaps.
We were looking for something there,
part of a ruined church - St Magdalene ...
We moved leaves, found a corner of something,
traced the cross shaped building.

We disturbed a frog.

Enclosed within the copse, we became part of it the other side of the red dogwood.

Whatever it was we were looking for there,
my dad and I,
whatever it was we were looking for
I believe we found it.'

Towards Chenies Mill there is a patch of land, covered in reeds and tall grass, between the mill stream and the other branch of the Chess. A noisy black machine was trundling across it, unlike anything I had seen before. The operator looked in my direction so I shouted across the water to ask what he was about. He explained that he was erecting a fence around the field so that they could graze cattle there.

After watching the stream for a while from the bridge I followed the path into Frogmore Meadow Nature Reserve. The thick blackthorn scrub here is an ideal place to listen to blackcaps and chiffchaffs not long returned from Africa. And there was a nuthatch calling in a small bluebell wood. Skittish horses cantered round one of the paddocks at Valley Farm as I approached the ford beside the old watercress farm. The fast-flowing

stream was not far below the small footbridge. From here I followed the road along Sarratt Bottom and then slowly up across the fields to Church End

Holy Cross church is always worth a visit. I noticed in particular the Jacobean pulpit and the eagle lectern which someone had burnished brightly. Two attractive modern windows provide a nice contrast.

After a filling lunch at the Cock I set off again across the fields to Micklefield Green and the motorway bridge on

Sarratt Road. Unfortunately this route involves about half a mile of



walking next to the thundering M25. In spite of the noise it was here that a muntjak deer broke cover and stared at me from about 50 yards before showing me its white tail and disappearing. They really have a knack of just vanishing. I walked on amongst wild cherry blossom until the path diverged from the traffic and brought me to the Lodge at Chandlers Cross, where the wisteria was coming into flower.

I made my way into Harrocks wood and enjoyed the fresh bluebells there. Somehow my attempts at photography can never do justice to the spectacle.

From there via Merlins wood I took the shortest route home across the field of oilseed rape, whose smell reminds me of rotting cabbage, and into Long Newlands Spring.

# CSW everyone free to believe

#### **Christian Solidarity Worldwide**

We were privileged to have a speaker from CSW on 18th May. CSW is a human rights organisation which aims to

promote a world free from religious persecution, where everyone can practise a religion or belief of their choice.

Our speaker has responsibility for CSW's work in the Middle East and North Africa where Christians in particular face much hostility. Consequently, many have left the region and some have experienced traumatic events. Even in a country with a relatively liberal background such as Turkey there is a strong current of opinion to suppress Christian strands of the region's history.

Our speaker is particularly engaged in Syria and in Egypt, where there is a large Christian minority. He reported an improvement in the situation in Egypt under the current regime. Nonetheless there are many who have suffered from past attacks. As a result CSW has started a programme of mental health support.

#### **Alternatives Trust East London**



Thank you to all those who contributed baby products to our Lenten collection for Alternatives. The staff gave Gill and Brian Thomson a warm welcome when they delivered a car boot full of the baby products recently. Alternatives works in one of

the poorest and diverse parts of London and provides intensive longterm support to over 100 women and their children every year. Alternatives runs a Family Hub for women and children to enjoy activities together. There is a 'Baby Bank' to help with essential supplies, and parenting support groups. The staff provide training, counselling and advice with issues such as immigration. Alternatives shares premises with St Edmund's church in the parish of East Ham. The building is an old Vicarage that has been attractively converted to include a small chapel and a variety of spaces for community use.



#### **Watford Schools Trust**

The Trust's schools workers will be running ExploRE activities for Little Green Junior School classes at Croxley Green Baptist Church in the week of June 30th.



ExploRE is an event that enables children, of all faiths and none, to explore life's deeper questions, spirituality and faith in a safe, creative and interactive way. Taking a broadly Christian perspective as a starting point, it gives children an opportunity to develop skills of personal reflection and to explore prayer in an open, inclusive and safe environment.

Over the course of a week the Trust's workers take over a room and fill it with up to thirty different interactive activities. During the week they invite the whole school to try out the activities, each one designed to help the students explore their own thoughts about God, themselves and their wonderful world and community. The activities pupils can engage with encourage personal reflection on issues such as forgiveness, injustice, thankfulness, big questions, identity and stillness.

#### St Oswald's Parochial Church Council update May 2025

At the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 27th April Helen McAlpine and Anne-Georgina Barnes were re-elected churchwardens and Clare Hook was elected to the PCC.

The PCC met on 27th May. Val Edwards reported steady progress in achieving improved safeguarding procedures and Karen Pryse expressed relief at the successful resolution of a long-running dispute with our previous gas supplier, SSE. The PCC thanked Val and Catherine Farman for their work on safeguarding and Karen for her continuing hard work as Treasurer.

Amongst other issues, the PCC discussed the position in church of the organ console. Clare Hook presented an update on the project to record our collection of kneelers and find new homes for those we no longer need. Clare has made contact with a number of those who donated and worked the kneelers and 30 have been distributed to them. Consideration is being given to creating a display of the kneelers in church and providing a record that people can consult.

# WATFORD FC COMMUNITY SPORTS AND EDUCATION TRUST

Paul Palmer, Associate Priest at All Saints', came to talk to the men's breakfast on 17th May about his job as Business Support Officer at Watford FC's Sports and Education Trust.

He emphasised that the Trust is a charity, independent of the football club, which has to raise its own funding. The Trust is a sizeable operation with a £4 million turnover, over 60 full-time and part-time staff, 80 sessional staff and over 50 active volunteers. As you would expect they run a range of football and sports development activities including in local schools. Little Green School won their Primary Stars Tournament last year.

Some activities are based in community centres on the Meriden estate and in Harrow. Way beyond football, the trust has a number of health and wellbeing programmes including for weight management and mental health. They reckon that the trust engages with over 15,000 people each year.

Quite how Paul manages to combine this busy job with being an active priest in Croxley remains a bit of a mystery!

#### Richard Doughty writes from St Oswald's Eco Group

#### Free herbs top the menu at St Oswald's

Want to pep up your cooking with fresh, home-grown herbs? The church eco group has replanted the open herb garden in the grounds that can be picked for free by any Croxley resident when the herbs are ready for

the pot from June onwards.

"Herbs are so easy and quick to grow - all you need is top soil mixed with peat-free compost," says eco group member Magdalena Pletsch as she adds lemon balm (also known as verbena - which makes lemonflavoured tea) and mint to a range of popular herbs including rosemary, thyme, oregano, sage and wild strawberries.

"The garden works really well with children, who love to regularly visit with their parents and watch the herbs grow and then play around the raised bed. It's a free resource for the



community and we'll be signposting it more when the herbs are really established.

"Maybe try it at home in the garden or on a window sill and get children involved," says Magdalena. "The main advantage is the herbs are fresh and available whenever you want them!"

Creating and nurturing the herb garden is just one of a series of eco activities that the group plans this year. They include installing a water butt, creating a children's nature trail and taking part in the nationwide

Big Butterfly count (July 17 till August 10).

The eco group is also organising litter picks for <u>July 5</u> and <u>September 20</u> around Croxley, and inviting children and their families to take part in the national Churches' Count on Nature (<u>July 6</u>) with a picnic when we will discover the variety of flora and fauna



species found living across St Oswald's grounds. For more information, contact Jonathan Cox or Brian Thomson

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#### Janet Tublin shares her love of gardening

# Who Does Your Garden Grow? Miss Ellen Wilmott 1858-1934

Many gardeners know the tale of Ellen Wilmott who threw seeds into people's gardens to add plants she felt were missing - the most popular of these being Eryngium Giganteum which became known as Miss Wilmott's Ghost. Apart from that I knew little about her.

Her father was a well to do London Solicitor who moved to Warley Gardens in Essex to a fabulous house with an amazing garden which included a stream and several natural ponds.

The whole family was interested in gardening but his elder daughter Ellen was the most interested. She was said to be a strong character and not particularly liked. She became an expert on roses and produced a book detailing each rose's source and history.

She supported financially many plant expeditions and in return fifty plants were named after her, including a scabious, veronica and campanula. Unusual seedlings in her garden were also developed and received her name. Many are still available today. Nurserymen loved her as she spent vast sums of money at their nurseries of at least £1,500 each year.

Ellen Wilmott sat on several RHS Committees sometimes being the only woman. She would wear a buttonhole of an unusual flower and would delight in seeing how many of the men members could identify it.

Her garden in spring had over 600 species of narcissus alone. Her weath started to dissapear and part of the land had to be sold off. The house was eventually demolished and from 1977 it became a nature reserve. it is now known as Warley Place and run by the Essex Wildlife Trust.








