


#### St. Oswald's Church - About us

#### FROM RAINBOW TO HOLIDAY CLUB



Holiday Club, for many, many years called Rainbow Club, began back in the early to mid 1980's, and was held every Friday morning in the school holidays.

Over time, this evolved to the more

familiar 5 mornings in one week, and recently changed again to 2 whole days and a half day. ## MOTHERS' UNION JUNE



We had an enjoyable afternoon with Michael Hart talking about some of our favourite hymns for Christmas, Easter, Advent and Pentecost. Accompanied by Michael on the keyboard we sang some of the verses of each. Michael also gave us interesting facts and figures relating to the hymns.

The words of "The Twelve of Christmas" were first written down in a British Children's Book called "Mirth Without Mischief" in 1870. The carol's origins are likely connected to memory games for children, with the songs repetitive structure making it a challenge to memorise. Someone decided to add up the total number of gifts in the carol and came up with the mathematical formula of N(N+1)(N+2)6 where N=12. The result is 364 which is ironically one gift for every day of the year excluding Christmas Day! Then in 2023 Michael said someone decided to work out the value of all the gifts and it came to \$201,972!

There is a Green Hill Far Away was another hymn we had picked — originally written as a children's hymn and is now usually sung at Easter. The words were written by Cecil Frances Alexander. It was first published in Hymns for Little Children in 1848 and became popular in 1868 when it was published in the first edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern. It was noted that the writer 'had surpassed all other writers of sacred song in meeting a growing demand for children's hymns'.

It was a fascinating afternoon with all the little facts Michael had and everyone enjoyed the singing. Thank you, Michael. Janet



#### A CROXLEY RAMBLER'S DIARY: 18 JULY

The seasons seem to move on apace. The wheat field at the road end is ready for harvest and I think the swifts have left for Africa already. The exceptionally dry weather means that Barton Way park is dried to a bright yellow. As I crossed it, four crows were prospecting for something to eat but with little hope of finding anything. Croxley's roads were quiet after children had been delivered to school but the Crazy Goat in New Road was doing good business. I walked along Harvey Road reflecting on the big changes ahead for their year 6 children on this the last day of term.

I turned off Lavrock Lane into the woods. Magpies chattered loudly overhead but there was little sound from smaller birds. We used to bring our small grandson here to give his parents a little respite during covid. He loved climbing up one of the wood banks using tree roots to give some purchase. But his favourite place was the bridge over the underground where he could watch the trains and perfect his imitation of the sounds they make, much to his parents' annoyance.

A group of underground workers, clad in orange hi-vis chatted beside the cutting. It wasn't obvious what they were there to do. Across the bridge and back in the woods a chiff-chaff was calling. The trees provided ample shade which was very welcome as the day warmed up. I crossed the main line towards Croxley Hall farm and then took the footpath beside the railway. The combination of thick hedges and a new fence around Joan of Arc playing fields meant that, unfortunately, there was no prospect of viewing the Great Barn from that side. I paused at the footbridge over the Chess and was pleased to see the water looked clear. Today's news included a report from the Environment Agency which found that last year's sewage discharges were the worst ever and Thames Water, which manages the Chesham works, was one of the worst offenders.



After a brief stop in Rickmansworth I let the 'train take the strain' to get me to Chorleywood. It is a steep climb through Betjeman Gardens up to the common where a sign amongst the dry grass proudly proclaims this is the oldest first golf tee in Hertfordshire. The golf course was opened in 1890. My path took me beside one of the ponds which still held water, the colour of green pea soup, overlooked by a small carved frog. Over the last century the common has changed from rough grazing to its

present use for recreation. Trees have grown instead of pasture making it a cool place to be on a hot day - a haven for dog walkers. I passed the church where a group of ladies was exercising enthusiastically.

The outside wall bears a plaque with an appropriate motto - 'I will bless the Lord at all times' Psalm 34.1 "God's will is goodness and loving-kindness, and good are the paths He leads us on."




A groundsman was preparing the cricket pitch for a match tomorrow. I marvelled at the precise mowing of the wicket and the extremely short grass. He patiently marked out the crease in white paint but remarked that all his work could be undone by thunderstorms promised for tomorrow. I took advantage of the Café on the Common in the new cricket pavilion. The Café is run by Mission EmployAble, a local charity whose aim is to train people with a learning disability so that they can find work.

Refreshed, I crossed into the grounds of Chorleywood House and walked across the lawns into the fields beyond. Here the vegetation has been allowed to grow and the path was edged with a stand of tall hemlock. Amongst the grasses, flowers of purple knapweed, white yarrow and yellow ragwort attracted the insects. Beyond the belt of trees at Wood Walk there is a gentle Chiltern view over the fields and woods of the Chess valley towards Flaunden. Descending towards the river I joined the path beside the Chess and enjoyed watching the water flow peacefully past.



At Sarratt mill I debated whether to climb the hill to Church End or continue beside the stream. But time was moving on so I chose the shorter route which meant a hard and hot climb up the slope towards Goldingtons. I pressed on past the church into the fields beyond and was glad to reach the trees by the drive to the Old Rectory. The occupants there have an interesting taste in

garden ornaments. There are standing stones and now a life-sized model elephant!



The path to Dawes Common is in dappled shade which encouraged butterflies - mostly whites and gatekeepers with some speckled woods too. Once or twice I thought I saw something a bit more interesting fluttering in the distance but, of course, it had vanished by the time i got close. I made my way through a paddock of horse jumps to Sarratt Green. The fun fair has arrived in time for the holidays but I turned in the opposite direction towards Chipperfield. After following the Green to its northern end I walked down the slope onto the shade of Plough Lane. The road passes some attractive cottages 'Under the Heavens' and led me for lunch at the Plough in Belsize.






#### COUNT ON NATURE

St Oswald's held our annual 'count on nature' weekend on 5th and 6th July. On the Saturday morning a stalwart group picked up litter from Croxley's streets and verges. Sadly litter seems a never-ending problem but we managed to clear some six or seven sacks worth.

After the family service on Sunday some of the younger members of the congregation joined some of us older ones in searching the grounds for insects and bugs. Weather conditions have been challenging for wildlife recently with high temperatures and drought. Nonetheless, we found some interesting specimens. These included gatekeeper butterflies, caterpillars of large white butterflies chomping on nasturtiums and a lesser stag beetle. But the stars of the show were hiding behind the church hall. There an old tyre had collected some rainwater and two young frogs were trying to keep damp and cool. We hope that our excitement didn't disturb them too much!













#### ORGANIST'S NOTES - AN ENDANGERED SPECIES?

This is the first of what I hope will become a regular feature in our Parish Magazine, where I will shed light on the wonderful world of the Organ, its music, and its use on our worship.

You might be forgiven for thinking that there is a wealth of top quality musicians emerging from our world-renowned choral and organ tradition in our cathedrals and college chapels. To a degree, this is correct. However, there is a perennial shortage of willing musicians at the 'grass roots' of the Church – all those plethora of village and small-town churches such as our own, which lack the resources and prestige to attract top rank musicians, but which still require music to be provided as part of our worship. It falls upon enthusiastic amateurs such as myself to do our best to achieve this. Many of our local churches struggle to find musicians – organists or not – to play their part.

In an attempt to address this, the Royal Collage of Organists is promoting 2025 as "Play The Organ Year". They are encouraging and supporting churches to arrange days where people who have never played an organ before can come along and have a go.

As part of this, we at St Oswald's are hosting a "Come and Play the Organ" afternoon on 20th Sept 2025, where anyone can just pop in and have a play on our organ, or just listen. I will be there to facilitate, encourage, demonstrate etc as required.

Do come along and have a go. Or, if you know of someone who might be interested, do encourage them to come.

Playing a church organ is not really very different from playing a piano, but it does have some distinctive challenges of its own:

- · More than one keyboard: often two, sometimes four or more.
- · No sustain pedal: a note will sound, at an unchanging volume, for as long you hold a key down. This has significant implications for how one approaches phrasing and articulation.
- · Dynamics: pressing a key harder does not make the sound any louder. Any dynamic control is achieved by controlling which pipes ('stops') sound there is quite an art to this.
- · The Pedals. There is a special keyboard played by the organist's feet. Playing with one's feet is not actually that hard until you start trying to do it at the same time playing something totally different with your hands! The pedals are generally used to play the bass line, freeing up the left hand from this duty.

· No two organs are the same – all are unique, and they have changed a lot across the ages and between regions. A fascinating subject in itself!

However, once one has overcome these challenges, there is a huge wealth of wonderful repertoire to explore, from medieval times to the Avant-garde and everything in between – in addition to playing hymns of course.

So, I would urge anyone with any musical interest to have a go! Don't be shy!

There is no need to wait until Sept 20th – just ask anytime.

#### .....TO ST. OSWALD'S IN NEW ZEALAND

This past January, I had a life-changing opportunity to travel to Aotearoa (the Maori name for New Zealand) for a friend's wedding. I've recently become interested in visiting various St Oswalds churches as I come across them. While researching where to visit on my trip, I discovered there is a St Oswalds on the south island of New Zealand, nestled on the side of the State 1 Highway in Wharanui, Marlborough.


What struck me particularly is that this is the furthest St Oswalds in the world away from Croxley Green. If you were to strike a pole through the floor from Croxley Green all the way through the entire earth, you'd end up in the ocean next to New Zealand, only 500km away from their church! In 2016, the Kaikōura earthquakes damaged the roof and walls of the church, closing it. The past 10 years it has been slowly restored, with the aim of opening later this year to the public, and to see its first wedding in over a decade.

While visiting on a beautifully sunny day, I was lucky enough to be received by the current stewards of the church, Leicester and Laura Murray. They showed me around the church (which is not yet open to public) and shared the storied history with me. Their son, Wilson, recently passed away during the reconstruction efforts, and a stained glass window was erected at his school to honour his memory.

I shared with them a Croxley Green St Oswalds mug, and up to date parish magazine, that I had brought from England with me. I let them know they are always welcome at our church and look forwards to if they are ever able to visit!






