




St Oswald's Church – who are we?



Our **Harvest Festival** takes place on Sunday 5th October with a Harvest Breakfast at 9.00am to which you are invited followed by a Family Service at 10.00am. This year our gifts of groceries etc. will go for New Hope's work with homeless people in the Watford area - see page 10.

Rewriting Futures

We will also be supporting the **Bishop's Harvest Appeal**. This year the Diocese has chosen **Mission Direct** as its designated charity. Mission Direct helps some of the world's poorest communities gain access to education. Their work in Uganda and Zambia is focused on



building schools. Within a year, the project we will be supporting - called Rewrite Their Future - will serve over 2,900 children of whom 1,700 will be benefitting from new classrooms.

At a time when 250 million children globally are not in school, this is a small but vital way we can help change that reality. Thanks to the generosity of supporters over the last 20 years, Mission Direct have



been able to build 49 schools. Nearly all of these are still open and have grown substantially.

The children who access these schools are given the opportunity to Rewrite Their Future because they are receiving the opportunity of a completely different life. They gain hope and aspirations that would have been out of reach if they could not attend a school.

Our donations helps Mission Direct continue this vital work – supporting a range of activities to Rewrite Their Future. Whether that involves laying bricks, funding feeding programmes, providing teacher training or other forms of support – these all contribute to more children being able to go to school.

Mothers' Union 11th September

This afternoon we had our own Richard talking to us and showing us slides of his holiday in Kyiv, in Ukraine in 2003. Richard and his friend treated themselves to stay in the five-star Premier Palace Hotel located in the heart of the capital of Ukraine. The luxurious hotel is more than 110 years old. They visited in February and it looked very cold with snow on the ground and them wearing their thick warm coats, hats and gloves. We saw the Independence Monument erected to commemorate Ukraine's Independence from the Soviet Union and it is the symbol of Ukrainian people's aspirations for freedom. It was unveiled August 2001. At the top of the 200 foot monument is the statue of the goddess Berehynia, goddess of Prosperity.

Another slide showed St Michaels Golden Dome Monastery in Kyiv, a very ornate building with the blue and white topped by the

many Golden Domes dedicated to Saint Michael the Archangel. It is located on the bank of the Dnipro River.

They also visited the site of the Chernobyl Power Station Disaster showing the devastation to the buildings and surrounding area. They had a guide drive them the 60 miles from Kyiv. Pripyat City is very close to the Chernobyl power plant, about 2 miles, and was built in 1970 to house the workers of the Chernobyl power plant

and other employees. After the disaster in 1986, the city of Pripyat was evacuated to the newly built city of Slavutych. The city was transformed into a desolate "city forest" within the Chernobyl Exclusion zone. Pripyat is now a ghost town, very quiet and eerie place, preserved as a time capsule of Soviet life and is an active site for research and tourism. It serves as a frozen snapshot with

abandoned apartments, schools, and an amusement park with a Ferris Wheel that was never opened.

We saw photos of the destroyed and devastated hospital with all the damage just left as it was. Many people did not want to move out of their homes and stayed despite the dangers. They were able to visit a lady who still lives in her home, but it was quite primitive and did not look as hygienic as one would like. They were invited in for tea and something to eat which I don't think they were too impressed with! But it just shows the poor conditions they still live in.

When they left the area they had to put their hands in a machine to check the radiation levels but they were fine.

We discussed whether all the buildings would still be standing, with the ongoing war, and no one had heard of any bombings etc in this part of Ukraine. It would be devastating if such beautiful and majestic buildings had been destroyed.

Thank you, Richard for coming along to show us your holiday trip, a very historic area to visit.

A CROXLEY RAMBLER'S DIARY

Brian Thomson writes of an eventful long summer weekend.

Friday 1st August Bats

About a guarter to nine in the evening, I walked down to Mill lock. It was still light but overcast and the clouds looked a bit threatening. Fortunately the rain held off because the Friends of Croxley Common Moor had arranged a 'bat walk'. This is a popular annual event and numbers were deliberately kept small. There were about a dozen of us plus two women members of the local bat group. One of them provided a refuge for injured bats. We were issued with bat detector machines in groups of two or three. The machine receives bat echolocation calls and turns them into sounds humans can hear. But the machines must be set at the appropriate frequency. 45khz was recommended to hear the most common species in that spot, the common pipistrelle. We set off along the river bank and it was not long before we picked up the first calls - a series of rapid clicks - from bats that were otherwise invisible in the gloaming. One of our leaders had an infra red torch which she shone across the water picking out the rapid movement of several animals hawking insects up and down the river. The talk, in hushed tones, turned to bat protection and worries about the Government's plans to relax the law to make construction projects easier. It was a fascinating evening.

Saturday 2nd August Woods

The morning was bright and sunny, as has often been the case this summer. I walked up Little Green Lane where the sun had encouraged a red admiral butterfly to settle on the track. Then suddenly there was a flash of orange and a Jersey tiger moth flew onto the hedgerow. At rest their wings are a striking pattern of black and cream covering the orange underwings. Several people have mentioned seeing one in their garden recently. They seem to be increasingly common - probably climate change again.



The cool shade of the woods was welcome. Dell wood, owned by the Woodland Trust, is popular with Croxley people, especially dogwalkers and joggers. Since covid I have noticed new paths have been made, which means, unfortunately, less space for bluebells. Another side effect of greater footfall is litter, especially plastic, which is not good for wildlife. Even worse is the risk of fire. In spite of signs to the contrary some people have lit fires in the wood which risk setting off a conflagration.

Further on, Merlins and Harrocks woods are quieter places. At this time of year birdsong is not as prominent. The nesting season is over and our summer migrants are on their way south. But it is still a lovely, relaxing place to be.

Sunday 3rd August Family Service

For the last few years St Oswald's has taken the August family service out of doors. This year we met outside the Kitchen on Watford Road for a service on Common Moor. We had borrowed litter-pickers from the Parish Council and began our time together collecting litter from Mill Lane and the woods above the canal. We met again at the bridge over the Gade and Fabian Hiscock joined us to give a short history of the Moor, emphasising how special it is, never having been cultivated. Our celebration of the natural world culminated with a short service of songs and prayers led by Tony.

Tuesday 5th August **Local History**

Another bright morning with a strong breeze. Thankfully we only caught the edge of storm Floris that battered Northern Ireland and Scotland. I was in Sarratt to join an archaeological dig organised by Wendy Morrison of the



Chilterns Heritage and Archaeology Partnership. This was in the field running down to the Chess from the big house at Goldingtons. The location has always seemed interesting from a historical point of view because the field has terraces, known as lynchets. And of course it is close to Sarratt's medieval church and water mill. This year's dig aimed to investigate the possibility of a Roman road running across the site. A scan of the field with LiDAR had indicated a possible route running

diagonally down the slope.

This was my first time at an archaeological dig. Others were a lot more experienced, ranging from A-level students to one person who had excavated at Luxor in Egypt. The previous week the volunteers had opened up two trenches roughly 15 metres long by 3 metres wide, across



the putative route of the road. One was located at the top of the hill, near the ha-ha in front of Goldingtons and the other at the bottom near the stream. The turves lay in a mound alongside a spoil heap. The subsoil is very stony here - not so different from many Croxley gardens. Our task was to take off a layer of the subsoil so that the archaeologists could judge whether we had uncovered anything promising. We used mattocks to loosen the top three or four inches and then shovelled and barrowed the spoil onto the heap nearby. This took most of the morning. In the process those of us in the top trench found bits of broken tile, probably Tudor, and some nails used to fix them. Then after lunch we used small trowels to remove the loose material.

At the end of the dig I returned to hear the results. The excavation had established that there was no Roman road across the field. However, it had produced good dating for the terracing of the field in the medieval period, so definitely not a Roman vineyard. Finds from the dig included a prehistoric arrowhead, Roman and Anglo-Saxon pottery as well as more recent artefacts. We were left with the tantalising suggestion of a Roman villa on the site of Goldingtons for investigation next year.

New! tope

Frazer Ansell of New Hope spoke at our family service on 7th September about the charity that we will be supporting at harvest time this year.

New Hope was set up almost 50 years ago by Janet Hosier and Sheila Meaning, two parishioners at St Mary's Church in Watford who were growing increasingly concerned about the growing number of rough sleepers who congregated in the churchyard. With the help of a local GP, Dr Tim Robson, they set up New Hope and a soup kitchen operating out of the church.

After a while they invested in two disused coaches and had them delivered to some wasteland in Whippendell Road, Watford. They used the coaches as a base in which to serve breakfast to the town's rough sleepers.

Word grew, as did their workload...

New Hope also grew quickly into a busy charity run by a small management team but driven by incredible volunteers and the public's goodwill.

Some years later, the two coaches were replaced with a custombuilt building, The Haven. Even back then, the team had an environmental conscience and the building boasted a grass roof to ensure it had a minimal carbon footprint. It was a heck of a job to mow the lawn though!

New Hope services

New Hope's Haven now provides rough sleepers with a hot shower, change of clothes, cooked breakfast, packed lunch and medical and housing advice every week day.

At our Sanctuary we provide year-round emergency accommodation for 28 homeless people each week. We also operate an emergency night shelter for up to 30 people from October to March. Our outreach team goes out at night to locate rough sleepers. We offer support, snacks, hot drinks and clean clothes and bedding.



We have a specialist unit supporting homeless people who are recovering from addiction.

We have a number of houses of multiple occupation where former homeless people are now transitioning back into regular life.

We provide tenancy support for 28 young families who have experienced homeless.

New Hope also has a horticultural therapy and creative wellbeing service called Cultivate. It recognises and shares the benefits of being in the great outdoors and of reconnecting with nature.

Our top line figures

Last year:

- 484 people received support at a New Hope service
- 273 people received a cooked breakfast and packed lunch at the Haven
- 18,151 nights of accommodation were provided, giving 133 people a safe place to stay for at least one night
- Our 24/7 Emergency Helpline answered 1,003 calls from people experiencing homelessness or seeking advice.
- 89 people improved their mental health through Cultivate. Earlier this year Cultivate received royal approval with a visit from the High Sheriff of Hertfordshire.

New Hope is so extremely grateful for the community of St Oswald's church to be supporting us during this year's Harvest Festival. You will be helping stock our larders for the winter night shelter which will open in the middle of October. Every donation made will help make a difference to the lives of people who have reached absolute rock bottom. It will help give them hope for a better tomorrow.

St Oswald's Parochial Church Council update September 2025

The PCC met on 23rd September.

Safeguarding was high on the agenda as usual. The Safeguarding team has surveyed PCC members about Culture and Leadership in the church. Various suggestions were made which will be followed up. One comment was that we all know each other well, and if an accusation were made it might be hard to believe. Our Safeguarding Officer emphasised that If there is an accusation it would be treated in strict confidence and, most importantly, it must be reported. All Safeguarding posters have contact numbers and there is a 'concerns and allegations information poster' at the back of the church. Victims, survivors and perpetrators will receive support.

The PCC thanked the Churchwardens and all the others who are working hard to keep the life of St Oswald's going during the vacancy. We looked forward to the outcome of the recruitment exercise which should be known soon after this magazine is published.

The PCC agreed that a number of changes to church facilities should be investigated. These are

- the possible temporary removal of one of the pews to make more space at the back of church for Cafe O and Donut Club activities;
- replacement of the wireless microphones;
- a possible display of the various designs of kneelers on the external wall behind the servery.

The PCC agreed that fundraising for the Parish Project in 2026 should go towards upgrading the facilities in the hall kitchen. The hall is an important resource for the local community and the PCC is consulting hall users about the kind of facilities needed.

The Churchwardens would be glad to receive comments from members of the congregation on these ideas.

St. Oswald's Church Kneelers.

In recent years the church has removed a number of pews to make it a more flexible space for worship and other activities. The PCC has been considering what to do with the kneelers no longer accommodated in the pews. **Janet Staerck** provides a history of the kneelers and offers her thoughts about them.



The original church kneelers were made from a blue plastic material and in the early nineties replacing them was discussed. They were splitting and really looked a bit of a mess.

As in 1997 the Church was celebrating its Diamond

Jubilee, it was decided that one of the commemorative projects should be making new tapestry kneelers that could last for a hundred years. This task was undertaken by Pen Smith, Jane Brading and Jane Duke in the summer of 1995.

The initial idea was that two or three designs would be selected that could be adapted to include a dedication on the side panels to remember a loved one or a special occasion. The initial request to see if the project was feasible, was to see if people would donate to buy a kneeler and work them. A note was also put in the Church Magazine (1995) to see if anyone was in touch with former members of St. Oswald's who would like to donate or work a kneeler.

The initial response was very encouraging and, on the strength of

that, 144 kits were purchased. Nine different designs were chosen representing Christian symbols to offer both a wide choice and to cater for all levels of ability. The designs were, the Dove on a red background, the Three Fishes, A (alpha) & Ω (omega) with a yellow cross, Triquetra, White Cross in a yellow circle with a blue background, White Cross with blue background and border, White

Rose, Yellow Cross on a red background with a border, and the Bread and Wine design. In addition, designs were selected to remember the late Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 and the Mother's Union. The cost of each kit was £20 – a considerable amount back then, for the wool thread, printed canvas, foam



backing and a label, totalling £2,919.92 with postage added. The cost of the basic kneeler kit is now £68.20 which would total for a similar number £9,820.80 without postage. The commemorative kneeler kits are now £165.00 and above.

Any donation was welcome and you could work the kneeler or someone else could. There was an introductory meeting in the Church Hall on 21st November 1995 at 8.00 p.m.

By February 1996, 56 of the kneeler kits had been given out. Pen was always on hand to give advice and show anyone how to do it by having "tea and chat" sessions at her home. The kneelers were worked with quite thick wool on a printed canvas using cross stitch. It was not just for the women, many men of the Parish worked the kneelers as well.

The first 50 beautifully completed kneelers were dedicated on Easter Sunday 1996 and put in the front pews. Everyone was encouraged to take the time and look at the kneelers – each and

every one is so special – they are not just made with wool thread, canvas, foam, but also with time, skill, love, care and a very special dedication to a family member or friend.

The next dedication of kneelers was on 29th September 1996. At this time a further 92 kneelers were being worked on. It was hoped that all would be completed by Easter 1997 in readiness for the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations.

It just shows the dedication and commitment of the congregation in working the kneelers to evoke memories of the person the kneeler is dedicated to. They provide a great deal of comfort.

The kneelers make a colourful display in the pews and are often a talking point amongst members of the congregation or visitors to the Church. When groups of young children from local Schools visit or children from the Church, the kneelers have proved useful teaching aids for Bible Stories or the History of the Church. The children are always fascinated.

Jane Brading introduced me to the book "A Single Thread" by Tracy Chevalier, it is a story in the 1930's with the effects of World War One still deeply felt. After a loss of finance Violet (the main character) moves to Winchester and joins the Embroiderers Group of Women who embroider kneelers and seat cushions, and finds support and community in their work. One of the women involved was Louisa Pesel, (who was a real-life person) who lived at this time and was a designer and competent embroider. She was an important part of the Winchester Cathedral group. The kneelers and seat cushions are still very much on display in Winchester Cathedral and are highly treasured. I can recommend it as a good read, twisting fact and fiction to make the story.

When it was first mooted to remove the side pews, thought should have been given to purchasing chairs that could accommodate the kneelers! If ever the main pews are removed and replaced (but at what cost in these difficult times!) thought must be given to purchasing chairs that have space for kneelers.

One of my first memories at St. Oswald's Church was of the wooden chairs in Church 4/8d (24p) for the standard chairs and 5/6d (27p) for the foldable chairs. The one main problem was

moving the chairs for services, for shows etc and that there were never enough volunteers to move them, and this must be taken into account again and how heavy the chairs are to carry and move.

Just because some of the now members of the congregation do not remember the people who



the kneelers are dedicated to, does not mean they should be disposed of. "Ars longa, vita brevis" - Art is long, life is short.

Perhaps some of these topics (and in the future) should be opened up to the congregation to get their points of view and feelings. If people realised donations of money for items in Church are likely to be disposed of a few years down the line they may be reluctant to donate!




We bring before you hate and division around the world as a reaction to the war in the Holy Land:


